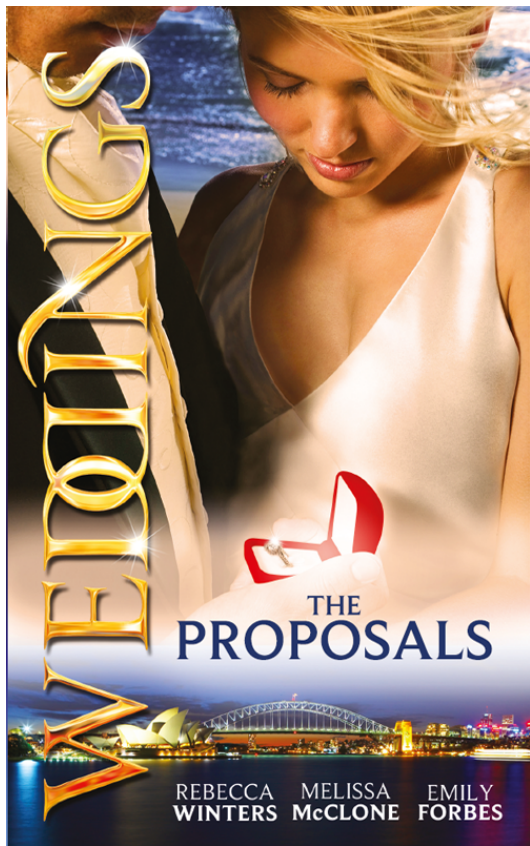
Аннотация
